

Dr. Lam began her presentation with a film clip from CODE BLACK, the television series filmed in General Hospital about the stresses of a busy Trauma Center. The scenes shown were much like scenes that take place every day in the LAC+USC Trauma Center. Patients near death are frequently brought back to life, yet there are still those that painfully can not be saved.

In her humanitarian work in Haiti, the Pacific Islands and Nepal, the resources immediately after the crises are so scarce that nothing can be done but to try to get something as vital as drinking water for the injured. Doctors who traveled so far to help don't always end up helping the disaster victims medically at first, but they still lend a hand wherever they can. Once conditions improve, they are able to set up field hospitals and really get to work, but even then, they must choose to help those that have the best chance to survive. It is a sharp and humbling contrast to the cutting edge resources available in the major Trauma Center at LAC+USC.
