

Y Dr. Pamelyn Close, 2013 honoree, ★ working with the Archstone Foundation Grant to the Adult and Pediatric Palliative Care Team and Department of Spiritual Care to enhance care for patients with serious illness, the C.A.R.E. Channel (Continuous Ambient Relaxation Environment) was purchased to provide a peaceful audio/video experience for patients and staff. Set as the default on channel 3 prior to every new admission, the C.A.R.E. Channel provides 70 hours of beautiful nonrepeating nature images with tranquil, relaxing music as an alternative to standard television. Rotating to evening skies and star patterns at night, this channel has been embraced as a part of the nursing care plan to help change the environment for patients exposed to the noisy activities of a busy hospital. CARES has offered to take on the sustaining annual license fee to maintain this annually updated channel in support of the care of patients.

In an effort to improve the quality of care at end-oflife for their patients, the Palliative Care team has proposed the renovation of two hospital rooms to serve as "swing" rooms/ comfort suites. Focused upon providing a more supportive

environment for patients and families, the comfort suites would have a more home-like design, a comfortable sleeping couch for a family member, and other amenities to allow families to focus on their loved ones' needs. Other County hospitals (San Francisco General and Olive View Medical Center) have found comfort suites to provide true improvement in the care of dying patients, not only because of the benefits of the space, but also because staff on these units can receive focused training to provide best practices at the bedside during this special time of life.

CARES looks forward to supporting these efforts in the coming year.
